

ENGAGE Impact in the Classroom

When I found out we were going 1:1, I was excited to find out what I could use this technology for in my classroom. I signed up for a lot of different tech courses, but the one that made the most impact on my teaching this year was the OneNote session. At first, I thought it would be an easier way to organize and collect my notes and assignments throughout the year, but it turned out to be so much more than that. Learning about OneNote Class Notebook completely overthrew my old method of distribution. Students still get their paper notes (writing math is easier on paper!), but now, they all have instant access to the notes I complete on OneNote on their own app on the computer. If they miss a day, the notes are already there for them to view. If they need to use the restroom, they can catch up on the notes right when they get back without disrupting the flow of the class. My students feel like they have greater access to the information, especially since we no longer have textbooks. With OneNote, they can see what we did in class on their own computers at any time. It was also a nice way to get our feet wet with technology without overhauling EVERYTHING we know about teaching and learning math. I'd call that a win!

Videotaped Readings Bring 24,000 Viewers to CMCSS Facebook Page

Recently, during American Education Week, Nov. 13 through 17, CMCSS launched a literacy campaign called "Read for 20." The purpose of the campaign is to encourage students, particularly younger readers, Pre-K through 5th grade, to practice reading for 20 minutes or more each day.

As part of the campaign, we videotaped "influential" people in the community reading a children's story to encourage families to make reading part of their daily routine. The "bedtime" videos were posted on the CMCSS Facebook page at 7 p.m.

Some of the folks who "loaned" us their influence are from the TN Titans Organization, the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, state, city and county government, published authors and the Nashville Predators to name a few. In addition to the videos, CMCSS will install reading corners in local businesses in which a wait time is typical. ELA Standards Implementation Check

The State Board of Education has launched an English language arts (ELA) standards implementation feedback survey (here) to gather public comments on the standards that Tennessee educators are implementing this year. All Tennesseans are invited to participate, and the survey will remain open through Jan. 31, 2018.

The state board is charged in state law with adopting academic standards for Tennessee students and with reviewing those standards regularly. The ELA standards were adopted by the state board on April 15, 2016, after an extensive period of public comment and educator review. This is the first school year the standards have been used in Tennessee classrooms, making it an ideal moment to gather feedback from teachers. Feedback from educators, parents, and other community members will help identify any areas of the standards that are in need of additional clarification or refinement. This implementation check will also help to synchronize the standards with textbook adoption so that teachers have aligned materials in their classrooms.



Benefits Update

New BlueCross BlueShield Insurance Cards

Effective Jan. 1, 2018, our vision insurance carrier will change from VSP to BlueCross BlueShield of Tennessee. As a result of this change, BlueCross will be issuing our group new insurance cards.

All employees enrolled in medical, dental or vision will receive a new insurance card around the middle of December. If you are enrolled in the vision insurance, please carefully read the communication that will accompany your new insurance card and make sure all your covered dependents are listed in the communication. Employees enrolled in the vision insurance, may also call the VisionBlue phone number listed on your new insurance card to check benefits, verify that a provider is in-network or make sure all your dependents have been properly enrolled. It is always best to check on coverage before making an appointment.

New Vision Insurance Carrier

We will be changing our vision insurance carrier from VSP to BlueCross-BlueShield-TN, effective Jan. 1, 2018. BC-BS-TN has offered comparable benefits with lower premium rates as shown below:

The vision network will be VisionBlue, which features a broad local and nationwide network, ensuring members have access to the vision and eye care they need no matter where they live, work or travel (<u>bcbst.com</u> – click on find a doctor to begin your search). Benefits will include the following:

- Exams, lenses and contact lenses are covered every 12 months frames are covered every 24 months
- You pay a \$10 copay for exams and a \$20 copay for lenses, then Blue Cross will pay the remaining cost of exams and lenses, up to \$150 for frames, and up to \$150 for contact lenses to the provider when you use a network provider.
- There are no copays when you use an out of network provider, and Blue Cross will pay up to: \$35 per exam, \$30 for single lenses, \$45 for bifocal lenses, \$60 for trifocal lenses, \$75 for frames, and \$120 for contact lenses. You must pay in full at the time of your visit and then submit a claim for eligible reimbursements.
- You may order glasses (<u>glasses.com</u>) and contact lenses (<u>contactsdirect.com</u>) online, while using your in-network allowance toward the purchase.
- As an option (but not required), you may try on new frames at a virtual eyeglass store (glasses.com) by uploading a picture of yourself.
- If you elect an out of network provider, you will incur more out of pocket charges.

This change will result in new BlueCross-BlueShield-TN ID cards being issued. Your new card will provide information for the plans you are enrolled in. BlueCross BlueShield will mail the new card to your home address beginning in mid-December.

*Please note members may use their current VSP benefits through December 31, 2017.

BlueCross BlueShield Prescription Drug Changes

The following prescription changes will be effective 1-1-18:

<u>SmartStart Program</u> – If you start taking a new specialty drug that is on Blue Cross' SmartStart list, you will now be able to get a 2 week supply on your first fill for half the cost. This allows you to make sure you adapt to the drug properly. It if works, the pharmacy will fill the remaining 2 weeks and you will pay the other half the cost. If it does not work, both you and our plan save money since the supply was for 2 weeks instead of 4 weeks.

BlueCross BlueShield Prescription Drug Changes Continued

The following prescription changes will be effective 1-1-18:

<u>Over-the-Counter Medications</u> – Because many medications are available over the counter, our plan will no longer cover certain prescription drugs that have over the counter alternatives unless your condition meets specific medical criteria. Over the counter alternatives cost significantly less than their prescription alternatives yet can have similar results, and you can purchase these popular mediations when you need them most without a prescription. <u>Compound Medications</u> – Safety concerns of compounded medications have had nationwide news attention, prompting legislation on both the national and state levels. Due to availability of commercial products, lack of approval by the FDA, questionable drug efficacy, and exceptionally high cost, all compounded medications will be excluded from coverage under our plan effective 1-1-18. There is an appeal process for those patients who are not capable of taking a commercially available medication due to age, physical condition, or need for an alternative route of dosage.
